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State Department Is Ready To Help 3,371 Americans In Scandinavia

WASHINGTON, April 11.-(A)-The 3,371 Americans in Scandi-

navia were offered tonight the full assistance of the state department in fleeing that area, which is rapidly becoming the main theatre of the European war.

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
