

\$2,929 COLLECTED IN Y FUNDS DRIVE

Another Report Meeting Will Be Held At Association Building Tonight

A total of \$2,929.50 was turned in last night at the first report meeting of the Y. M. C. A. budget campaign at the local Y building.

Goal of the annual campaign is \$7,500 and the \$5 workers are scheduled to meet at the Y. M. C. A. at 8:15 o'clock tonight and tomorrow night to report on each day's activities.

The total budget of the Y. M. C. A. for a year is \$20,735, this including the income from memberships and the dormitory, which taken together yields an income of \$13,235. The \$7,500 secured in the campaign will balance the budget.

It has been eight years since the local association had a deficit, it was announced last night as the workers were urged to see that all bills are paid when the association closes its fiscal year.

The Rev. Mortimer Glover, general chairman of the drive, congratulated the workers on the reports and paid special tribute to the division headed by J. W. Hughes for turning in the largest amount subscribed. On this division A. S. Trundle's team led all others with the sum of \$244.

The initial gifts committee is offering a bonus of \$25 to every team having 100 per cent attendance at the meetings.

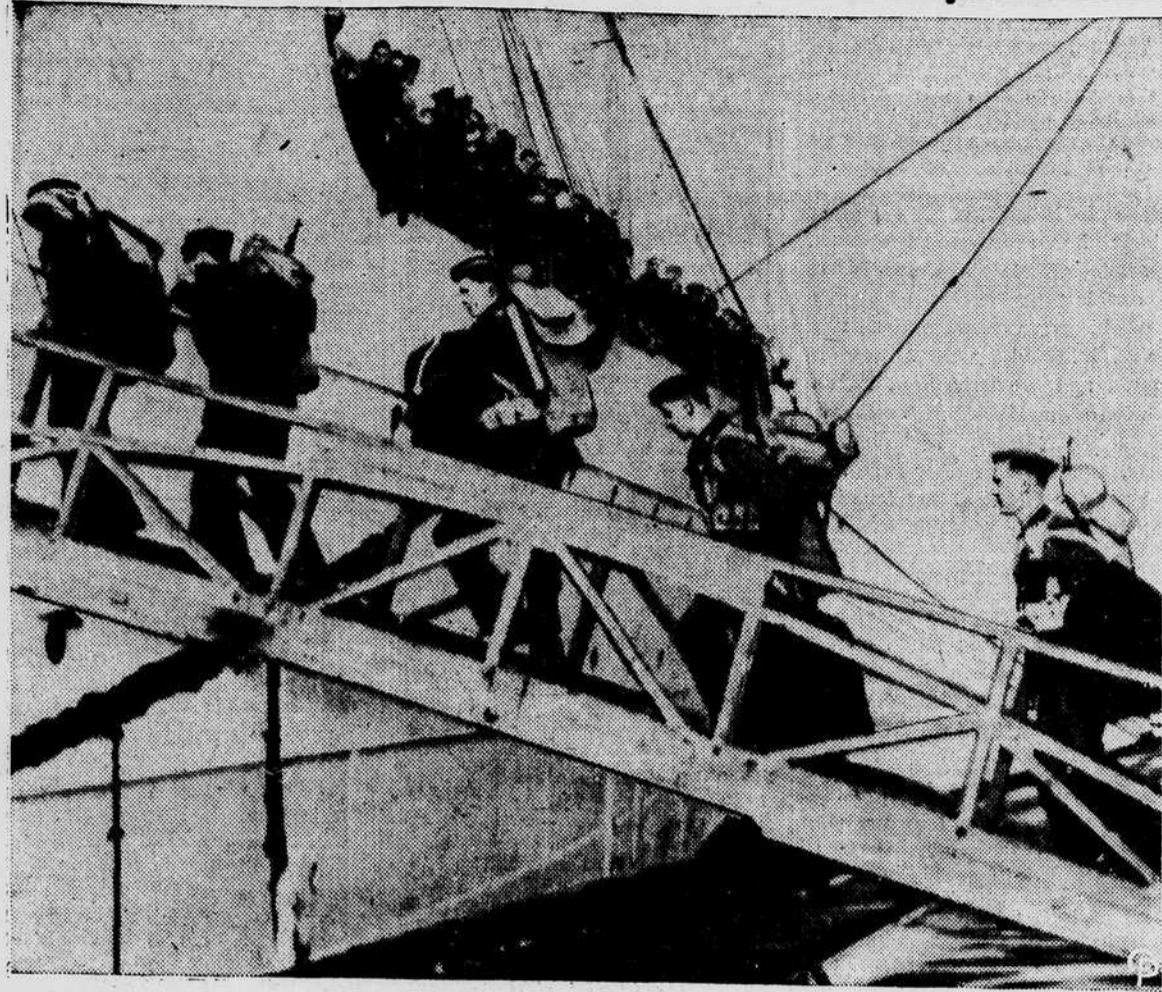
Warmer Weather Forecast For Wilmington Today

JULIA B. HUSSEY QUILTS NYA POST

Successor As County Supervisor Expected To Be Appointed By J. A. Lang

Mrs. Julia B. Hussey yesterday announced her resignation as National Youth Administration supervisor in New Hanover county to become effective December 1.

Mrs. Hussey gave as her reason for resigning the recent transfer of her husband, W. H. Hussey, to the Bladenboro territory.

A successor to Mrs. Hussey is expected to be appointed by John A. Lang, of Raleigh, state NYA administrator, in the near future.

Mrs. Hussey had been serving as NYA county supervisor since December of 1939. She first became connected with NYA work in the county in the capacity of project supervisor in July of 1939. Projects under the supervision of Mrs. Hussey have included: the negro domestic training course at 612 Walnut street, the seaplane landing float at the old Liberty shipyard, and commercial courses for the clerical project.

Mrs. Hussey said the negro domestic training course, which closes in January, had already placed six youths in employment, and the commercial course, including two classes weekly in typing, business English, spelling, shorthand, and correspondence work, had already placed a number of young women in private employment in the community. Tentative plans are also being considered for a new boys' workshop.

U. S. AT RIO FAIR

RIO DE JANEIRO —(AP)—Rio's annual sample fair has an American pavilion this year for the first time. The American Chamber of Commerce for Brazil arranged for the pavilion at a rental of about 1,050 for the month and a half which the fair runs in November and December. The pavilion occupies about 700 square yards.

Police Records Covering Ten Years Compiled Here

Work Will Enable Officers To Render Greater Help To Other Agencies

A WPA project involving compilation of police records for the City of Wilmington for the ten year period from 1930 to 1940 was ended yesterday, Police Chief Joseph C. Rouk reported.

The project required a year for completion and employed for a time as high as eight men working day and night on eight hour shifts, Police Chief Rouk said.

Completion of the project will enable the Wilmington police department to render greater assistance to state and federal government law enforcement agencies in apprehending persons, having local police records, who are wanted elsewhere.

The project, featuring the compilation of approximately 30,000 names, includes an individual file for each person arrested by the city during the ten year period.

Individual project cards show the name and address of the defendant, the nature of the offense, and where available, the disposition of the case in the recorder's court.

Police Chief Rouk said the project was designed to speed up the processes of identifying persons brought in to face new criminal charges and having past local police records.

City police almost daily will refer to and consult the cards on file for a further checkup as to the whereabouts and previous time served by each defendant. Records of cases disposed of both in the recorder's and superior courts are included in the files.

"The project will assist in our quickly determining the past police record of any person in question or under suspicion for infractions of the laws," said Police Chief Rouk, who pointed out that such minor cases as traffic law violations were not to be included in the files.

Rural Mail Carriers Note Holiday Thursday

There will be the usual city mail delivery service, however. On November 28, the North Carolina holiday of Thanksgiving, there will be a rural free delivery with no city delivery service. The windows at the postoffice will be open for an hour between 11 and 12 a. m., however.

This schedule of mail service is brought about because there is no way to compensate the time of rural free delivery carriers.

ROLAND DISCUSSES 'AMERICANIZATION'

Superintendent Of Schools Addresses High School P.-T. A. Meeting

"Americanization" was the subject of an address by H. M. Roland, superintendent of schools, at the monthly meeting of the Parent-Teachers association in the New Hanover High school auditorium yesterday afternoon.

Miss Anne Johnson, Bible student of the High school, led the devotional using several passages from the Bible and quotations from famous writers to illustrate her subject. Miss Johnson based her talk on the comparison of the Children of Israel to the peoples of Europe and Asia today. She showed how the people were persecuted in the time of Joshua as they are now undergoing the same treatment in Europe and Asia at the present.

Superintendent Roland urged the teaching in the schools and the home of the American way of living. He described the teachings and plan of government established by our forefathers who came to this land to seek free government, free speech, free churches. The democracy which resulted from the efforts of these early settlers was based on four main subjects in the platform: the home, public schools, the church and small local community organizations.

Mr. Roland used as an example of lost faith and spirit, the present situation in France. The French people, especially the younger generation, forgot their democracy, lost faith and spirit in their government and were content to spend their time looking for thrills, jumping from one place to another in a round of merriment. He urged the teaching in the home and school of young people the meaning of the democracy which the founders of this great nation fought so hard to establish and maintain that we might have the right of free action, free speech, preserve liberty and equality that the French gave up.

He explained the American home controls the church and the schools. Discipline must be started in the home when the child is young and continue as long as the child is in the home and under the guidance of the parents. The task at hand is to teach the child some sort of trade or profession most suited to the child and through which he might be of help to his country.

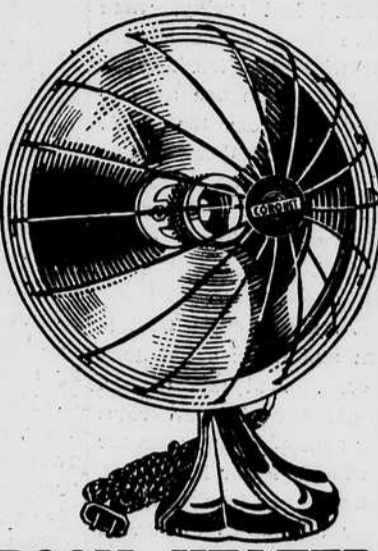
Mr. Roland urged the teaching of Americanism through American music in the schools, patriotism through speech, in their actions and through the proper respect for the flag of the United States and above all to be glad they are children of America.

A general business session was held following the talk by Mr. Roland, under the direction of the president, Mrs. J. E. Evans.
