

M'DONALD HELD IN CHECK CASE

Bound Over to Superior Court Following Hearing Before Recorder

John McDonald, of Hamlet, was bound over under \$400 bond for trial at the May criminal term of New Hanover superior court following a preliminary hearing yesterday in recorder's court on charges of forgery.

McDonald is charged with forging the name of John R. Bagwell to a check amounting to \$17.50 and allegedly passed on a local merchant recently.

In the same case, McDonald received 30 days on the roads on charges of passing an alleged worthless check on the same merchant on February 22.

Harvey Pack, of 513 North Third street, drew 60 days on the roads on charges of larceny and receiving of a wrist watch, valued at \$20, and 40 cents in change, the property of Walter H. Silberberg, on April 20.

Prayer for judgment was continued in the case of Harry Graham, of 208 1-2 Gore's row, charged with violating the liquor laws, until April 30.

Allen Planty, charged with larceny and receiving, entered a plea of guilty to charges of forcible trespass and was fined \$5 and taxed with the costs.

Nelson Bannister, 917 Gwynn street, was taxed with the costs on charges of assault on a female.

Trial of Mary McKay, alias Jane Doe, of 208 1-2 Gore's row, charged with violating the liquor laws, was continued until April 30 under \$250 bond.

Two cases involving violations of the traffic regulations and others comprising a varied minor infraction of the law were also disposed of during yesterday morning.

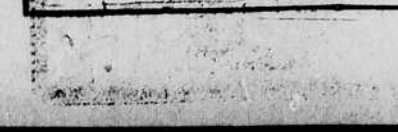

WOMAN IS KILLED IN CAR COLLISION

Two Other Persons Injured When Produce Truck Hits Auto in Robeson

LUMBERTON, April 23.—A woman was killed and two other persons were seriously injured when a produce truck crashed into the rear of an automobile, a mile south of St. Pauls on U. S. highway 301, early this morning.

Mrs. Molly Duncan, about 40, of St. Pauls, died instantly.

Mrs. Lucille Graham, 25, of St. Pauls, and a Fort Bragg soldier, John R. Matthews, stationed with the Second Balloon squadron, were in a local hospital with numerous injuries.

Pvt. Henderson, of Honea Path, S. C., stationed at the Fort Bragg air base, driver of the car, and W. F. Grumbles of Charleston, S. C., driver of the lettuce-laden truck, and his companion, J. A. Green, of Charleston, escaped injury.

Highway Patrolman Paul Michaux held Grumbles under bond pending an inquest into the death of Mrs. Duncan and the outcome of the condition of other injured persons.

Grumbles told Patrolman Michaux that the car was parked on the highway and that he did not see it until the crash. But Henderson contended the car was moving slowly in the same direction.

Newspaper Is Criticized For Birth Control Advertisement

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 23.—(AP)—A Jefferson county (Louisville) grand jury today presented a statement to Criminal Court Judge Lorraine Mix criticizing the Courier-Journal for carrying an advertisement recently advocating birth control.

Referring to a criticism of the newspapers by Archbishop John A. Floersh of the Louisville Catholic Arch-Diocese for printing the advertisement, the jury members, who said they were "men of all faiths and beliefs," commented that "the Archbishop seems to have sufficiently rebuked the press . . . and this objection was on purely religious grounds, but it seems to us that there is another reason."

The statement continued: "We are unanimous in believing from our observation and experience that it is against the public welfare for the press to openly advocate methods and measures by which physicians and laymen may be invited or instigated in the performance of criminal acts and we felt it our right and duty to so report to your honor."

The grand jury statement bore the names of the jurors, headed by the foreman John F. Hans, a piano tuner.

Last Sunday a letter from Archbishop Floersh criticizing the Courier-Journal and the national committee for planned parenthood for the advertisement was read by priests in Catholic churches throughout the Louisville Diocese and commented on by many of the priests. The letter said, in part:

"The action of the paper in printing such an advertisement is unpardonable, if for no other reason than that it is against the public welfare for the press to openly advocate methods and measures by which physicians and laymen may be invited or instigated in the performance of criminal acts and we felt it our right and duty to so report to your honor."
