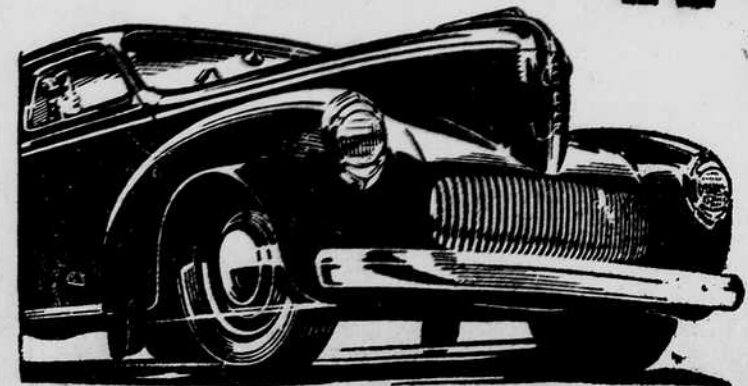

GOTHAM SUBWAY STRIKE AVERTED

At Pittsburgh, AFL teamsters agreed to return to work, ending a walkout of about 1,200 men which began 28 days ago and which interfered with the shipment and handling of defense materials in Pittsburgh's munitions mills.

The strikers agreed to go back to their jobs under a proposal of the defense mediation board for increases of 10 cents an hour for some classifications and 10 cents for others. The union originally demanded a flat 10-cent boost over the basic rate of 85 cents an hour.

The strike affected 179 trucking firms in Pittsburgh and officials of the plants said a week of operations would be needed to deliver material which has piled up during the strike.

The New York and Pittsburgh development topping off a week which saw a handful of strikes ended or nearly ended, but also witnessed the appearance of new disputes.

A strike at the Piper Aircraft Corporation, Lock Haven, Pa., was ended Friday through the efforts of state and federal conciliators. The company makes small planes used in the government's civilian training program.

"Failure to entrust to a responsible head the full authority to carry out the will of congress in the legislation enacted.

"Failure of a sense of urgency on the part of officials of purchasing organizations.

"The delay in establishing conservation methods and the use of substitutes for fear of creating unemployment.

"Unwarranted delays in building plants and facilities for the conversion of raw materials into finished products."

In connection with the fourth point, the study said:

"We do not wish to single out the automotive industry as an example because we realize fully its vital part in our industrial and civil life, but this industry was too long allowed to consume more needed defense materials in this first year of our defense effort.

"Since the needs of this industry are those almost identical with the furtherance of the defense program, some vision was needed by our government officials to restrict the automotive industry.

"Our government agencies are not amateurs in the methods of propaganda but they have failed in that they did not long ago begin educating the public as to the necessity of not squandering the materials used in our defense effort."

ARMY ADVOCATES U. S. EMERGENCY

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sued without formal concurrence of congress.

Legislative sources understood the request for a congressional declaration was favored by the department as a substitute for a simple resolution to permit retention of guardsmen and reservists beyond their single year of service.

The President received from the War department this week a recommendation that steps be taken to retain the guard and reserve officers.

Under the selective service act, drafted men may be kept in uniform beyond a year only when "congress declares that the national interest is in peril."

Like the guardsmen, selectees may not now be sent outside American possessions and the western hemisphere under existing statutes.

In connection with the reported administration plan, congressional sources disclosed that War Secretary Stimson has requested a conference with legislative leaders to discuss the matter.

An informed official said Stimson's request was transmitted to Speaker Rayburn and that while no date had been fixed for the conference, it probably would be held next week.

It was learned that Stimson, in his communication to Rayburn had included a memorandum from President Roosevelt on the subject together with a lengthy one of his own.

JOE HUNT WINS TENNIS CROWN

Annopolis Star Gives Navy First Title In History Of Tourney

HAVERFORD, Pa., June 28.—(AP)—Joe Hunt, of the Naval Academy, took less than an hour—54 minutes to be exact—to defeat Ted Olewine 6-3, 6-0, 6-1 today to win the national intercollegiate tennis championship at Merion Cricket club today.

The Annopolis star gave a perfect demonstration of how the nation's No. 4 ranked men's player hits them in defeating the University of Southern California sophomore. In one streak Hunt won ten straight games.

Hunt, seeded favorite, lost the championship last year on the same courts to Don McNeill, of Kenyon college. But today it was a different story. The Navy player took an early 3-0 lead in the first set and continued to pile up first-sets and deadly chop shots to carry him to an easy victory.

The University of Southern California player, second seeded in the tourney, came back to team with Charlie Mattmann and win the doubles championship from Bill Canning and Bob Hippenstiel, of the University of California, 6-3, 6-4, 6-4.

The 22-year-old midshipman's victory gave the Navy its first championship in the 57-year history of the tournament and the east's first champ since Julius Seligson of Lehigh, won in 1928.

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conferees met and ended their session at loggerheads over a \$50,000,000 item for the disposal of surplus commodities which the senate had inserted in the bill.

"Some think it should go in this bill, some think it should go in the farm bill and some think it should not go anywhere," said Senator Adams (D-Colo.), chairman of the conference committee.

Although he added that he did not know when he would call the committee together again, there seemed little doubt that some compromise would be worked out. Unless the bill is finally enacted by Monday night, the WPA will be without funds until it is.

Mr. Roosevelt's power to devalue the dollar was granted originally, over intensive Republican opposition, in 1934. It authorized him to cut the gold in the dollar to 59 per cent of its former weight.

In 1936 and 1938 the power to chop the remaining nine per cent from the original value of the dollar was continued for two years period, always after a spirited battle with Republicans and one faction of the Democratic party.

This time Senator Adams endeavored to remove the devaluation powers from the bill, leaving the stabilization fund intact. He and Senator Taft (R-Ohio) feared that dangerous inflationary possibilities were bound up in the devaluation authority.
