TROOPS EXHORTED TO 'FANATICISM'

LONDON, Dec. 21.-(AP)-Publicly recognizing the cold difficulties and torments suffered by the retreating German armies in Russia, Adolf Hitler announced tonight he was taking over personal direction of the Nazi land forces, and he immediately appealed to his soldiers-"fanatically, as he put it - to wait out the winter for new arms and troops.



DEFENSES SET FOR 'ANY EMERGENCY'

MANILA, Monday, Dec. 22-(11:15 a. m.-9:15 p. m. Sunday, EST)-A flotilla of 80 enemy transports was sighted this morning off Lingayen gulf, north of here on the west coast of Luzon, and the Army, in announcing the hostile approach, said there was no doubt that this was the beginning of Japan's major drive on the Philippines.

The port of Lingayen, 110 miles northwest of Manila, lies in the sheltered waters of the Gulf of the same name.

The Japanese tried one landing there last week, but were pushed back into the sea by Philippine land forces.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters has anticipated an attempted landing in force there and preparations have long been completed to meet just such an eventuality. The first repulsed Japanese thrust


