"Equipment unsuitable for heavy, high speed trains will have

to be used where possible in local shuttle service to transport war workers to and from industrial

"Since essential military and civilian travel must not be impeded, it will be necessary to readjust schedules. This will undoubtedly call for fewer trains in some territories and districts, and perhaps the complete elimination of trains used for pleasure and other non essential travel. Lengthened fast run schedules with more stops will make it possible to take care of points formerly served by motor bus or by local trains.

"Where train service is discontinued, the affected communities must be served by bus. Thus the general rearrangement of passenger transportation, which must be undertaken at once, necessarily involves close coordination of railroad and motor bus facilities in order to make the buses available for effective local service." 2
