**Edith Mae Hill, Thomas White To Wed In June**

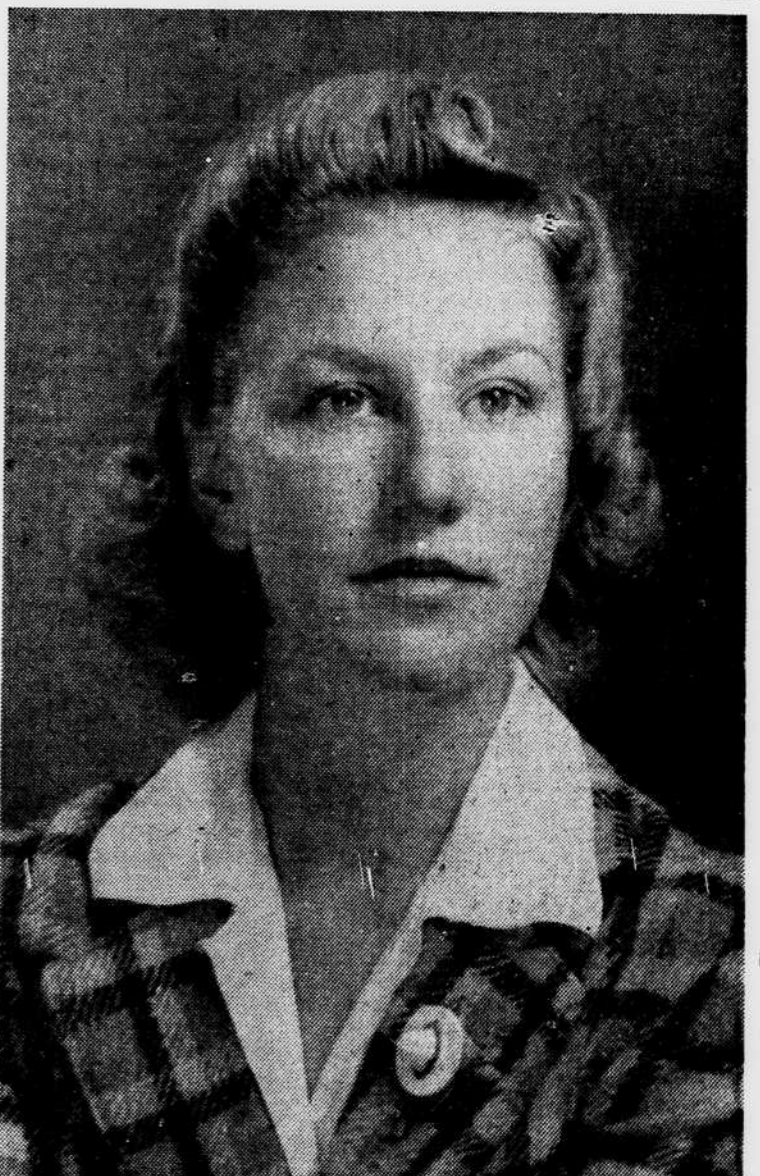
