AIR RAID SIRENS **NOW IN EFFECT**

Alarm Signal Is Considered To Be Generally Satisfactory

With the installation and testing of the five large air sirens in Wilmington, the official air raid warning signal is now in effect. George Stearns, secretary of the New Hanover Defense council announced

"On the whole, the sirens are satisfactory and in the case of 'dead spots', a situation prevalent in every city of any size, other means will be induced to bring the signal to the attention of the public", Stearns said.

Police cars are a common method of bolstering and relaying the signal in "dead spots", it was pointed out. 
