## Cairo Broadcast Reports Planes Land In China After Attack

NEW YORK, June 12-18- Les lie Nichols, MBS Correspondent has reported in a broadcast from Cairo that at least some of the United States planes which raided Men seeing Gone With the Wind Tokyo and other Japanese cities in their sensational April 13 attach landed in China, MBS headquar ters announced tonight.

Nichols said that 11 pilots. cluding several wounded, of the 79 who participated in the raid with Brigadier Gen. James H Don little had now passed through Cairo en route home from Chi His statement that these 11 ha landed in China after the raid was the first public hint regarding this phase of the operation. Their start ing place has been a strictly-ker

The statement was made in broadcast Wednesday night Cairo which Lester Gottlieb, MBS public relations director, said had been withheld until tonight when released by the office of censor ship.

The pilots were reported return ing home now in a sub-stratospher bomber for a well-earned rest. Gen.
