MAY FATALITIES FEWER THIS YEAR BONDS

Sixty Dead In Highway Accidents, Against 103 In 1941

RALEIGH, June 16 .- (AP)-A total of 60 persons were killed in 52 fatal accidents in North Carolina during May, 43 less than the 103 fatalities in 85 fatal accidents during May, 1941, Motor Vehicles Commissioner T. Boddie Ward reported today.

The highway death toll for the first five months of this year mounted to 352 in 296 fatal accidents, a decrease of 22.1 per cent from the toll of 460 deaths in 391 fatal accidents for the first five months of 1941.

Ward said that the decrease in ratalities on North Carolina's high ways so far this year and especially in May was greater than the decrease recorded in the nation as a whole.

Rockingham county led the state with six highway fatalities in May. Alamance and Buncombe had three each; Beaufort, Bladen, Cumberland, Henderson, Nash, New Hanover, Orange. Pender, Richmond, and Robeson had two each; and Cabarrus, Carteret, Davidson, Durham, Edgecombe, Forsyth, Gas-Granville, Greene, Halifax, Jackson, Lenoir, Martin, Meckienburg, Northampton, Onslow, Pasuotank, Pitt, Randolph, Rutherford, Sampson and Wayne had one each.

Cumberland county has had 26 highway fatalities this year, Onslow has had 16, Wake and Johnston 11 each, Alamance, Mecklenburg and Davidson 9 each; Currituck, Guilford, New Hanover, Northampton, Richmond, Rockingham, Robeson, and Union 8 each; and Buncombe, Gaston, and Nash

Durham has had four traffic fatalities this year, Greensboro 3, Asheville, Charlotte and Raleigh 2 each and Winston-Salem 1.
