

Attendance at local baseball and softball games is comparatively poor?


There is no municipally-sponsored recreation program? Playground athletics with regularly planned events would help a lot.

It was the fifth defeat for Lee, who had won eight times, and His be's sixth success against four losses.




"But isn't there a chance you might get hot against the field tomorrow?"




