## Health Office Records Show New Hanover Residents Live Longer

IS INCREASING

Wilmingtonians are living longer than they once did, according to statistics of the consolidated health office here.

Dr. A. H. Elliot, city-county health officer, revealed yesterday that his records show ages at death of New Hanover county residents have increased during the past 29 years from 28 to 48. In the past 10 years alone, the doctor declared, the average age of death has increased from 42 to 48 years.

"I am willing to deny that Wilmington has an abnormally high death rate and I am writing to the state board of health and the U. S. public health service for their figures on our death rates and on those of the state and the nation as a vhole, Dr. Elliot said. "These figures will be released as soon as received.

"The implication of recent newspaper articles and paid advertise ments, as I understand, is that Wilmington's death rate is abnormally high because of the detrimental effect of the chemically
