

### OCS BRINGS HIKE TO CD BUSINESS

### Anti-Aircraft School Stimulates Tremendous Upswing At Army Camp

Transfer of the AAA Officer Candidate School from Fort Monroe, Va., to Camp Davis has resulted in a tremendous upswing in the sale of clothing by the Property Equipage section of the Camp Davis Quartermaster. It was learned yesterday.

Figures in the office of Lieut. Col. William R. Schaefer, Camp Davis Quartermaster, show that since the thousands of officer candidates have moved into Camp Davis for training prior to receiving their commissions, the sale of clothing to officers has increased from \$1,964.99 in March to more than \$10,000 in June. Indications are the peak has not yet been reached and that soon Uncle Sam's retail sale of clothing will swell above the \$10,000 a month mark.

Clothing which is sold to officers is secured by requisition, stored and sold by the Quartermaster Property section headed by 1st Lieut. Middleton R. Merrill, Quartermaster Property Officer.

### Suggestions On Methods Of Preparing For Heat Are Reprinted At Davis

Suggestions by headquarters of the Fourth Service command pertaining to the feeding and clothing of troops in excessively warm weather are being reprinted at Camp Davis for the benefit of unit commanders.

One letter from the service command said it is possible that excessive perspiration results in the loss of water soluble vitamins, B1 and C, and recommended free use of citrus drinks to counteract this condition and thus avoid widespread fatigue.

Fresh fruits, rather than proprietary substitutes, were recommended.

The use of proper headgear when troops are in the field in hot weather was stressed by the memorandum distributed at Davis. It was pointed out that the garrison cap, most common soldiers' headgear, offers no protection against the heat, in fact, is considered detrimental when the mercury is at a high point.

Three other types of headgear were recommended for wear instead of the garrison cap. Camp Davis troops are equipped with the various kinds of hats and caps. Consumption of cold drinks and ice cream should be discouraged after a person has been exposed to excessive heat or sun rays for any length of time, the memorandum said.

### Property Of CCC Outfit Is Given To Camp Davis

With the liquidation of the Civilian Conservation Corps, all property belonging to CCC Company 682 (D) is being turned over to the Quartermaster at Camp Davis. It was learned yesterday at the office of Lieut. Col. William R. Schaefer, Quartermaster.

First Lieut. Middleton R. Merrill, Quartermaster Property Officer, is the officer responsible for all property affected by the transfer and has accepted Subsistence, Medical and other supplies which will be turned over to the respective departments of the Quartermaster Office in the near future for their use.

### SAMPSON USO DRIVE

Mrs. O. J. Peterson, chairman of the USO drive for Sampson county, announced today that donations now total \$1,390.73 for this county. Contributions are \$200 short of the national quota allotted by headquarters in New York City, and \$450 short of the \$1,750 goal set by the county.

## Arrests In City Decline By 29 During Past Month

A decrease of 29 arrests was shown in the total number of persons apprehended by police during July as compared with the June figure, according to Chief C. H. Casteen's report submitted to Mayor Hargrove Bellamy.

July's arrests totaled 1,231 compared with 1,260 in June and 1,302 in May.

Of the 1,231 made in July, 896 were white persons against 335 negroes. In June 1,004 white persons and 256 negroes were apprehended.

Arrests dealing with automobiles showed a decrease compared with the June figure in probation to 17; the total number apprehended each month—the figures being 914 of June's 1,260 total and 716 of July's total of 1,231.

Last month's arrests which had to do with automobiles were violation of the traffic law, 618; speeding, 39; reckless operation with serious injuries, 1; reckless operation with damages, 1; reckless operation, 15; operating automobile while license revoked, 2; obstruction of sidewalk, 2; no chauffeur or operator's license, 8; no city license, 10; larceny of an automobile, 5; improper auto muffler, 1; improper state license, 3; improper equipment, 1; hit and run driving, 1; and anti-noise law, 3.

Automobile accidents in July totaled 67, a gain of 12 over the figure for the preceding month.

Chief Casteen reported six automobiles stolen, three found and three returned to owners.

Nine bicycles were stolen during the month, five found and five returned to owners.

Chief Casteen said four and half gallons of liquor were sent to court and reported none seized or destroyed during the month.

### City Has Acute Shortage Of Housing Facilities Now

Wilmington has reached its most acute housing shortage in recent months, the local defense housing committee reported yesterday.

Yesterday's survey of living accommodations listed at the Homes Registration office revealed that only about 50 rooms are registered, while, at least 200, generally are on file.

The housing shortage daily grows more acute here, according to the committee, which appears to Wilmingtonians who own living quarters, especially in the lower price brackets, to register with the HRO.

The committee particularly desires accommodations for couples, as well as houses and apartments for families. It reopened its appeal to landlords to rent room to bachelor girls who are taking defense jobs in the city.

### New Red Cross Director Arrives At Camp Butner

DURHAM, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Colonel H. W. Huntley, commander of Camp Butner, today announced the arrival of G. L. Seay at the camp to become field director for the Red Cross. Seay formerly was stationed at Shaw Field, S. C. He was assigned an office in post headquarters building where he will conduct all functions of the Red Cross.

Most important part of his work, Seay stated, was assisting the military personnel financially and otherwise in emergencies as well as providing recreation and comfort to infirm soldiers.

## 69 LOANS HANDLED BY CAMP RED CROSS

### Lets Out \$1,998.20 To Soldiers For Personal Problems

During the month of July the Red Cross field office at Camp Davis maintained its swift pace in assisting soldiers with personal problems. Among other services, the field office made loans totaling \$1,998.20 to 69 soldiers.

Field Director Hiram W. Person, in his monthly report, stated that 1,206 cases were open during the month, all of them dealing with situations in which the Red Cross could be of help both to the individual and to the camp.

Analysis of services performed during the month showed that furlough applications were numerous. In emergencies, the Red Cross office, with the cooperation of local chapters, investigates and reports on the advisability of granting emergency furloughs.

The Red Cross maintains a spacious headquarters building in the center of camp, convenient to all military personnel and, in addition, operates a recreation building in the station hospital for the benefit of convalescents.

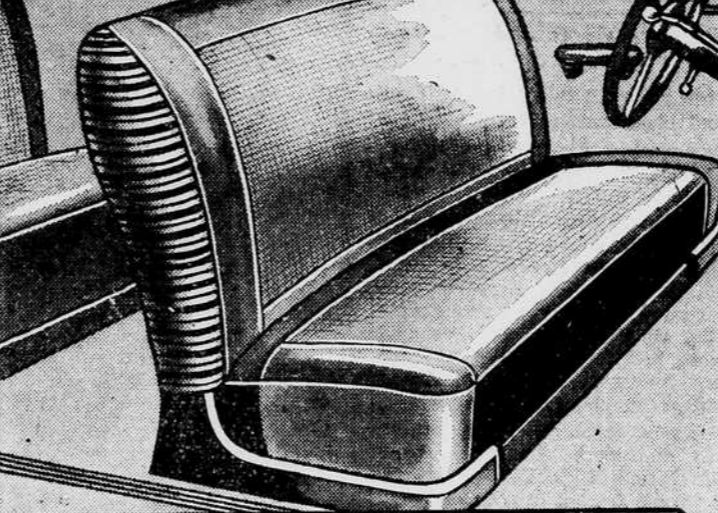
