Declaring that we should be thankful "with all our hearts" this Thanksgiving, Wallace asserted that the young people of America know we have a war to win. "They know that the German

leaders will throw all of the strength and might of Germany against the United Nations this winter," his message read, "but they know that the rising tide of Allied production in the hands of our brave fighting men will withstand this terrorism and carry the fight to the enemy. "More and more the German people are realizing that the tide is turning," the vice-president asserted. He added that after this war we shall be faced with "a great problem and a great opportunity—the building of a peace which is firm, just and enduring."

RED CROSS MEET SLATED SHORTLY

Units Will Hold One Day Conference In Tide Water Hall Here

Red Cross war fund committees in this area will hold a one-day conference in the Tide Water assembly room on December 2.

The announcement is made by Henry Gerdes, chapter chairman. The time is from 1 to 5 p.m., and all chapters in this area are urged to send representatives.

Representing the national organization, Sam B. Montgomery, regional director, and James G. Kershaw, special field representative, will be in attendance.

"This conference provides a new opportunity for Red Cross leaders in this section to review with representatives of the National and Eastern Area offices, the tremendous growth of Red Cross along all fronts since America entered the war," Mr. Gerdes declared.

"On the basis of what has already been accomplished in Services to the Armed Forces, Civilian War Aid, Disaster Relief and Foreign War Relief, we can form a more accurate estimate of what the Red Cross must do in the future and what our War Fund aims must be next March 1."

Realizing the importance of the social services at home supported by the Community Chest, the American Red Cross has relin-

quished its traditional Roll Call period in November in order to avoid overlapping, Mr. Gerdes explained. However, plans for the Red Cross War Fund of 1943, which will provide the means for carrying on all Red Cross services, both rational and chapter, are already being made and will be discussed in detail at this meeting.
