Mr. Reynolds was graduated with honors from the Rhode Island School of Design in 1907. From that time until 1920 he worked as designer in several stained glass studios in Boston and Cambridge. During a stay in Europe he studied masterpieces in glass in the great French and English cathedrals.

Mr. Reynolds, the holder of a medal of honor from the Boston Society of Arts and Crafts, has designed many notable windows. Among these are: "The Glorifica-

tion of Healing" window in the nave of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, New York. The two great transept windows in Princeton university chapel. The windows in the American Memorial cemetery chapel at Belleau Wood, France; two windows in the American church in Paris, France. Following the lecture there will be a social hour.
