### TIGHTER POST-WAR PEACE PLAN ASKED

### **Bloom Appeals For Prompt** Action On World Collaboration Measure

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16-(P)-Fresh moves developed in congress today for a more stringent post-war policy resolution that would require United Nations action to set up a world organization with military powers to suppress future aggression.

Appealing to the senate prompt action on the post-war collaboration measure, Chairman Bloom (D-NY) of the House Foreign Affairs committee declared that congress in 1910 took a "far stronger" stand for outlawing war than the proposal presently con-

Simultaneously, a senate bloc assailed the post-war resolution approved by a senate foreign relations subcommittee as "vague in its commitments," and proposed alteration of a section which adereign nations in the establishment and maintenance of international authority with power to prevent aggression and to pre-serve the peace of the world." 
