

Red Sox Capture Doubleheader From Yanks To Take 2nd. Spot

BOSTON, June 11.—(AP)—The Boston Red Sox won both games of a doubleheader 2-1 and 4-1 today from the New York Yankees to sweep the four-game series and hand the champions their 11th defeat in their last 13 games.

The twin triumph moved the Red Sox into second place.

"Tex" Hughson gave up only three hits as he set the Yanks down in the opener and drove in what proved to be the winning run in the fourth when he got an infield hit with the bases loaded.

The Sox settled the nightcap early for Clem Hausmann, who chalked up his third straight victory, Jimmy Bucher started things in the first inning with a home run deep in the right field stands.

Pete Fox beat out a hit but was forced out by George Metkovich, who went to third on Bob Johnson's single. Bob Doerr's long fly scored Metkovich, and, after Joe Cronin walked Roy Partee brought home Johnson with a double.

 NEW YORK, June 11.—(AP)—If you were looking for a first-class hawk caller it would seem you could go through the stands at Ebbets field and select one at random, judging from the noise that emanates from that baseball emporium in waves. Or in valves, Fritz Ostermire might say.

Oddly enough, though, the one thing, or one of the things, lacking in the Brooklyn Dodger setup this year has been a holler guy. A real, leather-junged, buzz-saw voiced gent out there in the infield who could put the old zip and dash in the team when the going was tough.

Well, they've got one now in stocky Eddie Stanky, the short-stop-second baseman obtained from the Chicago Cubs, and if Stanky only hits .220 and his fielding leaves something to be desired, he should be valuable because of his voice, although it's admitted it's difficult to field a fast hopper with your mouth, and then get the ball away neatly.

Lippy Leo the Last
 The Dodgers haven't had a real holler guy out there since Leo Durocher decided he'd rather have his legs folded under the bench than folding out at shortstop. Leo's capable successor, Pee-Wee Reese, tried hard enough but his voice was something of a pip-squeak and you had to watch his mouth to see if he was saying anything, and even then he might just be chewing gum.

The various inept successors to Pee-Wee also were on the strong, silent order, and the Dodger fortunes have been more or less on the downgrade. On the rare occasions in recent years when Durocher, the defending champion holler guy, got on, there the team perked up, despite the fact the lippy pilot gradually was heaving a point he practically was playing on a trolley with a 10-foot range.

Stanky—and anyone making an intentional typographical error with that name had better start running, as the little guy is a fireball—has none too impressive a record in the majors, although he was American association batting champion with Milwaukee in 1942.

TIGS BREAK EVEN WITH WHITE SOX

CHICAGO, June 11.—(AP)—Frank "Stubby" Overmire pitched the Detroit Tigers into third place today by shutting out the White Sox, 1 to 0, on four hits in the second game of a doubleheader before 23,461 after the Chicagoans had rallied for a 4-2 triumph in the opener.

The Tigers had to go to the ninth inning of the nightcap, however, before Rudy York singled home Charley Metro with the lone run of the game to end the Chicagoans' eight game winning streak and give the chunky Overmire the decision over Thornton Lee in an all-southpaw duel. Lee allowed six hits. It was Overmire's second victory of the year.

Overmire walked only one batter and didn't allow a Sox runner to reach second base.

 We have an idea he will click with the Dodgers, and mollify the fans, who had been grunting around all season over Branch Rickey's apparent disinclination to do anything to bolster the infield. Stanky, incidentally, has baseball connections. His father-in-law, Milt Stock, played third base for the Phillies when they won the pennant in 1915 and he later played under Rickey with the Cardinals, which doesn't necessarily make Stanky a great ball player, of course, but it doesn't do any harm, either.

DETROIT TENNIS TOURNAMENT OPENS

DETROIT, June 11.—(AP)—Eight seeded players, headed by Doris Hart of Miami, Fla., and Billy Talbert of Indianapolis, have first round matches tomorrow as the week-long national clay court tournament opens at the Detroit Tennis Club.

Miss Hart, ranked second to defending champion Pauline Betz of Los Angeles, who is idle, meets hard-hitting Joanne Dunn of Des Moines, Ia. Second-seeded Talbert starts off the men's division by meeting Edward Donovan of Detroit. Top-ranking Francisco Segura of Miami has a bye.

A'S GRAB PAIR FROM SENATORS

PHILADELPHIA, June 11.—(AP)—Staging batting rallies in the fifth inning of each game the Philadelphia Athletics swept both ends of a doubleheader from the Washington Senators 6 to 1 and 6 to 5 today before 18,691 to push the Senators into last place.

The A's broke a three game losing streak when they took the first game behind the steady six-hit pitching of Bobo Newsom. Three George Myatt enabled the A's to score three runs off Mickey Haefner in the fifth inning of the opener.

BROWNIES SPLIT TWO WITH TRIBE

BROOKLYN, June 11.—(AP)—The Boston Braves overcame a four-run deficit to defeat the Brooklyn Dodgers 8-5 in the second game of a doubleheader to gain an even split today. The Dodgers won the opener, 5-4 in 10 innings.

After scoring four times in the first inning of the nightcap, the Dodgers were halted by Ira Hutchinson, who relieved Dick Barrett. The defeat, witnessed by 20,302 paid admissions, ended a four-game Brooklyn winning streak. It was Boston's first win after six straight losses.

Philadelphia Phillies Purchase John Peacock
 NEW YORK, June 7.—(AP)—The Philadelphia club of the National League announced today the purchase of Johnny Peacock, veteran catcher of the Boston Red Sox at the waiver price of \$7,500. Peacock batted .202 in 48 games for the Red Sox in 1943.

CARDS TAKE TWIN BILL FROM REDS

CINCINNATI, June 11.—(AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals gave the Cincinnati Reds a double beating before 24,377 fans today, 3 to 1 and 4 to 1, and at the same time set a National League record for double plays in twin bills with nine.

The St. Louis infield made four double plays in the opener and five in the second game. The previous mark of seven was set by Philadelphia in April, 1917.

Cincinnati hopes of getting even in the second game flew over the left field wall in the sixth when three successive Red Bird batters Walker Cooper, Whitey Kurowski and Danny Litwhiler, lined identical homers against the laundry across the street.

The Cards got a single run in the fifth on Emil Verban's safety, a walk and Pepper Martin's double.

Harry Gumbert pitched the nightcap for St. Louis and gave the Reds their only tally on a walk, a sacrifice and a single in the first inning. Although he allowed six hits and two walks, Gumbert pitched to 28 batters because of his infield's double kills.

Behind six-hit pitching by George Munger, the Cards got single runs in the first, fourth and sixth innings of the opening game while the Reds could manage only a single run which came in the seventh on Eric Tipton's single, a double by Frank McCormick and a long fly.

OTTOMEN CONQUER PHILLIES TWICE

NEW YORK, June 11.—(AP)—Phil Weintraub's single which scored Manager Mel Ott in the 12th inning with one out in the nightcap gave the New York Giants a 6-5 decision over the Philadelphia Phillies today, and enabled them to sweep the double bill. The Giants won the opener by the same score, 6-5.

Ray Hamrick's homer with two aboard in the ninth tied the score at 5 all and sent the second game into overtime.

Johnny Rucker hit a pair of home runs in the nightcap and Phil Weintraub hit his second of the day in the fourth.

Coming from behind in the eighth inning of the opener with three home runs by Joe Medwick, Phil Weintraub and Billy Jurgens, the Giants scored four runs to tie the score. When Mappy Reyes singled Ray Berres home with two out.

Jimmy Wasdell hit a homer for the losers, while Charley Letchas batted in two runs with a pair of hits.

Bill Voiselle, the fifth Giant pitcher got credit for the victory while Ken Raffensberger, who relieved Charley Schanz in the eighth suffered the loss.

CUBS HAND BUCS DOUBLE DEFEAT

PITTSBURGH, June 11.—(AP)—The Chicago Cubs shut out the Pittsburgh Pirates in both ends of a doubleheader today, 5 to 0 and 1 to 0. Big Paul Erickson let the Bucs down with two hits in the first game. The nightcap was a pitchers' duel, Bob Chipman allowing only five hits and two Pirate hurlers yielding the same.

Only 31 players faced Erickson in the opener while his mates rapped Max Butcher and Art Cucurullo for 12 safeties.

Tony York, who got four hits in the first game, came through with the Cubs' winning blow in the nightcap when his single sent Bill Nicholson home from second.

Manager Frank Frisch and Outfielder John Barrett of the Pirates were sent to the showers in the first game after an argument with Umpire George Magerkurth.
