HEALTH SURVEY FACING DELAY

Completion of the U.S. Public Health Service's survey of the administration and practices of the Consolidated Board of Health awaits the arrival of a sanitary en. gineer and one or two doctors and there is no indication that they will arrive in the near future, Dr. A. H. Elloit, city-county health officer, stated yesterday.

The work of the sanitary engineer will be to inspect restaurants and dairies, and doctors will examine the veneral desease control program and general administration of the board of health.

Two sanitary engineers and one public health nurse have finished their examinations, he said.

Upon completion of surveys by individual representatives reports are required to be made to Dr. W. H. Sharpe, Jr., of Bethesda. Md. who is in charge of U. S. Public Health Service in Distrct No. 2. The extensive surveys of the de-

partment were asked by the citycounty health officer after Mayor Bruce B. Cameron declared in a meeting of the board that correction of existing inefficiencies should be made immediately, whatever the cost.

Back of Mayor Cameron's strong comments was his encountering of poor sanitary conditions in certain residential sections of the city that he visited on an inspection tour of buildings for possible condemnation.






