## YANKS SWEPT OUT OF PENNANT RACE

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 29.-(AP)-The determined St. Louis Browns swept into a tie with the Detroit Tigers for the A-rican league pe nt today by twice conquering the New York Yankees while the Tigers split a double header with tail-end Washington.

The victories eliminated the Yankees from any mathematical pennant chance and assured the Browns of second place.


