# BATTLE IN ITALY ALMOST STYMIED

ROME, Oct. 30 .-- (P)-The battle simmered down to scattered patrol clashes today, with the Germans adding to the misery of mudbogged Allied troops by troublesome artillery fire.

The enemy shelling south and outheast of Bologna was officially escribed as heavier than anything ously endured by the Ameriten Fifth army. Nazi engineers were observed planting great new fields and stringing more barbed wire in front of Bologna, indicating they intended to fight obtintately for the big communica-

In slightly improved weather conitions yesterday tank-supported American infantry advanced a mile in the mountains coutheast of Bocaptured the hamlets of Bosco and Serra, and reached the vicinity of Casalecchio, within two miles of the Bologna - Rimini high-

swift-running streams and extenive flooded areas made every mile d'Allied advance a slow, tedious process even when it was not rain-

German forces still held out on high ground near Predappio, a town just south of Forli, which Polish troops captured yesterday. The Poles were handicapped because the only road into Predappio was unusable. Supplies were carried across the Rabbi river by hand. The adjacent hamlet of Verano di Costa, birthplace of Benito Mussolini, apparently remained in German hands. 


