

SURPLUS DISPOSAL

Sold During October

WASHINGTON. Dec. 3.— (P) -Four government agencies disposed of \$26,772,000 of surplus war property during October at 64.7 per cent of its cost or appraised value.

W. L. Clayton, surplus war property administrator, said the October disposals brought the total for the five months since June 1 to \$111,779,000 at 76.1 per cent of cost or appraised value.

Total inventories of surplus property at the end of October were placed at \$708,737,000.

The War Department is by far the largest source of surplus war property. Surplus on hand at the end of October had a value of \$510,964,000. not yet reported to disposal agencies.

Clayton said this material would be "screened" for possible use by the Army and Navy.
