ANSWER TO PREVIOUS PUZZLE

ESCAPED CONVICT SOUGHT IN MURDER

WASHINGTON, March 10.—(AP)—Police pinned a murder charge today on Joseph Medley, 43-year-old escaped convict, in the slaying of Mrs. Nancy Boyer in a fashionable Washington apartment.

But they must still catch their man, also wanted elsewhere for questioning in the bathtub deaths of two other women, both of whom died from unnatural causes still obscure.

Less than 48 hours after Mrs. Boyer's body was found in her apartment, shot three times, Inspector Robert J. Barrett, chief of District of Columbia detectives, obtained a warrant charging Medley with murder in the first degree. The warrant was signed by United States Commissioner Needham C. Turnage.

The search for Medley, who was serving a 30 to 60 year sentence for kidnaping and armed robbery when he escaped from a Michigan State prison last November, centered around pawn shops.

It was on a pattern of fingerprints, found in the Boyer apartment, and a series of pawnshop visits by a man identified by shop proprietors as Medley, that the police picked the escaped convict as their man.

Medley has been indicted in the slaying of Miss L. A. Fisher, a 28-year old textile worker whose body was found in a New Orleans hotel bathtub Christmas eve.

He also is wanted for questioning in the death of Mrs. Blanche Zimmerman, 38, a telephone operator, whose body was found in a Chicago hotel February 17.

Medley had made the acquaintance recently of Mrs. Boyer, Barrett said, through a third person who met him in a downtown Washington restaurant. The man, police said, had been seen in Mrs. Boyer's company frequently since that time and attended a card party Tuesday at her apartment, Barrett said. Her body was found Thursday night.

Writer Says Tokyo Fires Blacken B-29 Fuselages

(Editor's note: The following eyewitness report on the Tokyo B-29 raid was written and offered by Martin Sheridan, Boston Globe correspondent, to the combined American press.)

OVER TOKYO, March 10.—(AP)—I not only saw Tokyo burning furiously in many sections but I smelled it. Huge clouds of smoke billowed high above the city.

The conflagration was so great that the bomb bay doors of the superfortress, the underside of the fuselage and the gun blasters were blackened with soot.

This bomber was one of more than 300 from American bases in the Marianas—forming the greatest fleet of superfortresses ever put in the air—which gave the Japanese capital the hootoff early today.

Our navigator didn't have to give the pilot a bearing on Tokyo. Other bombers were ahead of us and 40 miles from the city we could see the reddish glow of fires already started.

As soon as we reached the Japanese mainland we saw scores of smaller fires, en route to Tokyo, and possibly set by the Japanese as diversionary ruses.

The superfortresses went in singly, a complete change from their previous formation tactics.

Over the outskirts of Tokyo, our plane tore through high, somber clouds of smoke and fire. The smoke seemed inside the plane. It smelled like the interior of a long-burnt building.

Suddenly there was an opening through the pall of clouds and there was Tokyo.

I have never seen such a display of destruction, nor had such an experience.

Fires were raging in several multi-block areas and creating almost daylight conditions. In addition, there were hundreds of blazes throughout the waterfront area, most densely populated section in the world. Another indication of the conflagration's intensity was the turbulent air conditions we encountered over the target.

Our plane—named "patches" and bearing a semi-nude painting on its nose—struck down and up drafts and bounced 2,000 feet in split seconds. Crewmen were tossed from their seats. Several struck their heads violently against the top of the plane. They were protected from injury by flak helmets.

Maj. Walter F. Todd, of Ogden, Utah, operations officer and company pilot, said he thought we were hit by flak but speedy examination proved everything was operating satisfactorily. A moment later, 2nd Lt. Leo P. Ziemiansky, of Buffalo, N. Y., navigator, sang out: "Three, two, one, mark!" at the last word of the count, the bombardier, 2nd Lt. Thomas C. Moss, of Aurora, Ill., dropped the "eggs" in the target area.

As a civilian noncombatant, my contribution was limited to a brown beer bottle empty, of course.

Several searchlights played on the plane a few moments but we saw no interceptors and only a few scattered flak bursts.

We did see the city getting a terrific plastering and they'll need a highly efficient fire department to put out the blazes.

War Costs Germans 50 Generals On West Line

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS ALLIED EXPEDITIONARY FORCE, March 10.—(AP)—The war has cost the German army 50 generals on the western front alone, 18 of them killed and 32 captured, Allied headquarters disclosed today.

In addition, the Wehrmacht has lost three colonels in command of divisions, four admirals and one vice-admiral. Among the generals captured were six full generals, 12 lieutenant-generals and 14 major generals.

The dead include two field marshals, Erwin Rommel and Guenther Von Kluge, the latter a suicide. Rommel, victim of an Allied air attack in France, was commander of German army group B. Von Kluge was commander in chief in the west.

Membership Of UAW Shows Big Decrease

DETROIT, March 10.—(AP)—The United Automobile Workers Union (UAW), with more than one million members, sustained a membership decrease of 113,741 from May through November, George F. Addes, international secretary-treasurer, said today.

Addes attributed the decrease to cutbacks in war production plants during that period.

The secretary-treasurer reported the UAW's income during the six-month period totaled \$3,248,719.02 and expenditures \$3,256,886.57. He recommended an increase in dues to \$1.50 a month, 85 cents being retained by the locals and 65 cents going to the international. Of the present \$1 a month dues, the local retains 60 cents and sends 40 cents to the international union.
