Use of Physically Unfit Men In Overseas Service

WASHINGTON, March 15-(U.P.-Many physically unfit men are being sent overseas for Naval duty and the Navy Department says this must stop.

It was disclosed tonight that the Navy's Bureau of Medicine and Surgery and the Bureau of Naval Personnel have sent a joint membrandum to all ships and stations telling them what to do about the ituation.

"Numerous reports of receipt of men in the overseas areas who are not physically qualified to perform all of their duties, have been received by the Bureau of Naval Personnel," said the memorandum, which then directed:

"In view of the transportation involved, the unwarranted burden on medical facilities in advanced areas and the present congestion of men awaiting medical or dental reatment in those areas, it is exremely urgent that steps be taken to prevent transferring such men overseas."
