#### Fifty Persons Killed By Road Accidents In State During January

RALEIGH, March 22. - (AP) Fifty persons were killed and 327 injured in motor vehicle accidents on North Carolina highways during January, the State Highway Safety Division announced today.

Rural areas lead in fatalities with 34 deaths as compared to 16 in urban areas. Hickory and Kings Mountain led the cities with two fatalities each.

Pedestrian accidents took the highest death toll. Speed, excessive in proportion to surrounding conditions, was reported as the chief cause of all accidents.


