

SEC IS PROBING POLITICAL DRIVE

PHILADELPHIA, March 23.—(U.P.)

The Securities and Exchange Commission is investigating certain public utility companies that may have greased the political bandwagons of 1944 with secret contributions. These investigations are authorized by the Holding Company Act of 1935, which require the commission to prosecute utility companies that contribute directly or indirectly to political parties.

Reported Missing In Action. Now Is Safe

NEW BERN, March 23.-Lt. C. A. Stearns, pilot of a P-51 fighter plane which was reported missing in action last May 30 while escorting bombers of the Army Air Forces on a mission over Ger-
