Brake Check Program Is Started In City

The method by which Wilmington policemen started active participtation yesterday in the nationwide Brake-Check program, an effect to reduce accidents and conserve the dwindling supply of cars was announced by Police Chief C. H. Casteen.

"In making the check," Chief Casteen explained, "the officer will place a wood block one inch thick on the floor board under the foot pedal. He then depresses the pedal. If it strikes the block before the brakes begin to grip, the brakes will be considered inadequate and in need of immediate attention."

Brakes will likewise be considered unsafe if they grip while the pedal is slightly more than one inch from the floor board. The driver will be urged to have corrective measures taken.
