MARKETS CLIMB TO HIGH LEVEL

NEW YORK, April 24.—The stock market today continued its climb to new high levels for the past eight years on expanding volume.

Transfers for the full stretch amounted to 1,830,000 shares compared with 1,380,000 yesterday.

The Associated Press 60-stock average was up 4 of a point at 64.8, another peak since August, 1937. Both the industrial and rail composites scored new tops. The market exhibited breadth, 977 issues appearing. Of these, 523 were up, 230 down and 224 unchanged.

Prominent on the swing were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, International Telephone, Allied Chemical, Engineers Public Service, U. S. Rubber, American Can and Eastman Kodak.

U. S. Steel directors, after the close, declared the regular \$1 dividend and reported first quarter net of \$1.04 a common share against \$1.23 in the first three months of 1944. Results were about in line with forecasts.

Bonds improved. Cotton was 35 cents a bale higher to 5 cents lower.

Better curb performers were Brown-Forman distillers, Aluminum Ltd., Clayton and Lambert and Pantepec. Turnover here was 380,000 shares versus 350,000 Monday.

N. C. BLACK MART HITS POULTRYMEN

RALEIGH, April 24.—(AP)—The State Department of agriculture charged today that "hundreds" of farmers of the State were "selling their poultry to black market dealers at prices up to six cents a pound above the OPA ceiling," and were thus doing permanent damage to the poultry industry.

A department spokesman said that as a result poultry processing plants were able to operate only about one day per week and housewives were finding it virtually impossible to obtain poultry at grocery stores.

The Agriculture Department statement came only a few days after the Raleigh district OPA headquarters announced that an investigation of alleged black market activities had been underway in the State for more than six weeks.

Basing his charges on a survey recently completed by the War Food Administration, Marion Dilday, the agriculture department's poultry marketing specialist, said that out of State buyers and truckers were taking poultry out of the State. "Breeding flocks are being sold and permanent damage to the poultry industry will result," he said.

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News Coverage Is Major Problem At Peace Parley

SAN FRANCISCO, April 24.—(AP)—United States delegates struggled today with what some term a major problem of the conference—news coverage.

After an underling had failed to shoo reporters away from the hotel floor where meetings are being held, Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich) came from a closed session to explain that attempts were being made to fix a policy through which the maximum amount of information could be given to the public.

Vandenberg said he thought satisfactory arrangements would be made within 24 hours to furnish general information on developments.
