Leon Brogden, Wilson's mentor, who is slated to take over NHHS athletics in June, said last night that the 'Cats' team yesterday was far superior to that which took a 16-0 shellacking a few weeks ago.

The first Wilson tally came in the fourth frame when Thorpe Smith led off with a single.
