OPA Reports 'Slight' Black Market In Meat

As point values rise and the nation's meat supply dwindles, Wilmington proudly reports "very little" black market operations.
This is the opinion of the New Hanover War Price and Rationing board and generally of the man on the street.
Office of Price Administration officials avowed yesterday, that "we're very pleased to know there is so very little black marketing of meat here. This is one phase of black marketing that we have not had here, or at least not extensively."
While admittedly pleased over the few cases of illicit meat handling in Wilmington—those chiefly concerning red points—the OPA acknowledged that heavy black market meat operations were possible here "without us knowing it."
This was explained away with the fact that "we usually get re-

WITH THE AEF What The Generals Say

WITH THE U. S. NINTH ARMY ON THE ELBE—(P)—German generals who have been flowing into American prison cages like commuters in the five o'clock subway crush have given some interesting sidelights of life behind the scenes in Germany.
One, whose father was executed among scores of smaller fry in the Hitler bomb plot purge, said that Reichsmarshal Hermann Goering knew of the attempt on the life of Adolf Hitler and, although he took no active part in it, made no attempt to halt it.
He said the explosive was smuggled into Hitler's war room in two types of experimental knapsacks. Hitler was known to have a weakling for inspecting all new equipment and had ordered them brought in. This allowed the conspirators to get them past Hitler's watchful guards but the time device for the explosion went off just as Hitler stepped behind the door into an adjoining room.
Another general closely connected with Field Marshal Von Rundstedt said that Von Rundstedt wanted to give up after the failure of the Ardennes offensive but was kept from doing so by the knowledge that he never would be able to complete the peace negotiations under the eye of the SS.
This officer said that Hitler called all divisional generals involved in the Ardennes attack to his headquarters December 12. All their weapons were taken from them and they were then led into a room and were harangued by Hitler. At the conclusion the Fuehrer said the drive was aimed at putting Von Rundstedt in Antwerp in 14 days but warned that if the offensive failed "the Reich would be in a bad situation."
Another German general who served on the staff of the late Field Marshal Erwin Rommel in the desert campaign, and escaped from Tunisia the day before the Allies took Tunis, had high praise for General Eisenhower's tactics which wound up the African campaign in May 1943 with a bag of 340,000 prisoners.
Up to that time, he said, the Afrika Korps had suffered only 50,000 casualties itself, although it had lost great numbers of Italians.

WPB Restores 'Spot' Reconversion Plan

WASHINGTON, April 27. (P)—The War Production Board today restored to a nationwide effect its "spot" reconversion plan for civilian goods production.
The action, a major step in WPB's program to get partial reconversion underway as rapidly as munitions cutbacks occur, puts the plan back in operation in 184 cities and major industrial areas where it has been suspended.
Under the spot plan, any manufacturer who can prove he has labor and machinery not needed for war work may apply to his WPB field office for permission to commence the manufacture of civilian and consumer products.
