Manager Joe M'Carthy Hinted **Connie Mack Sees** Two Records Made By His Athletics

PHILADELPHIA, July 22,-- Manager Connie Mack (AP) probably is the only person to witness two record-making performances by his Philadelphia Athletics.

On September 1, 1906, at Boston, Mr. Mack waved his scoreboard through 24 innings as his A's defeated the Boston Red Sox 4-1.

The now 82-year-old manager. with a 1945 edition of the scorecard, guided the Athletics through another 24-inning battle yesterday, but there v 's no decision-the game was called because of darkness with the A's and Detroit Tigers deadlocked at one-all.

When the A's and Red Sox set an American League endurance record, both pitchers. Jack Coombs of the Athletics, and Joe Harris, of the Red Sci went the distance. Coombs was nicked for 15 hits and struck out 18 batters, one more than all four pitchers' in the modern marathon. And he ha pitched two days previous to his record-


