PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 31-(A) -Alabama's undefeated, untied Crimson Tide will batter against contest for Coronet Magazine and the University of Southern California's rugged Trojans today in the 32nd renewal of the Rose Bowl grid classic before an estimated sell-out crowd of 93,000.

Led by slim Harry Gilmer-described by many critics including Alabama's coach Frank Thomas as perhaps the greatest all-time passer-Alabama will take the field with at least a one-touchdown favorite over the beefier Trojans, who will defend an all-winning Rose record. Southern California has won eight previous bowl games.
