Greer, Girl Scout commissioner of Wilmington, the idea started at the first World Conference of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts held at the Girl Scout Camp Edith Macy, Pleasantville, N. Y., in 1926, when the world was at peace. Delegates from Girl Scout organizations in twenty-nine countries were gathered there, including Lord Baden-Powell, founder of both Boy and Girl Scout movements; Lady Baden-Powell; and Juliette Low, who established the Girl Scout movement in the United States.
