

ATOMIC DEFENSE NOT YET SOLVED

Maj. Gen. Leslie Groves Urges Military Influence In Shaping Policies

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27. (AP)—Maj. Gen. Leslie R. Groves, chief of the Army atomic energy program, said Wednesday that no defense against atomic bomb attack is yet possible and urged strong military influence in shaping atomic policy.

Groves told the Senate Atomic Energy committee that he believes two to four Army and Navy officers should serve on the proposed Atomic Energy Control Commission. He added that the nation must regard the new form of energy primarily as a military weapon.

Personal Views He emphasized that he was giving the committee his personal views, and not necessarily those of the War department. He recommended that the nations primary attention be given to atomic energy as a war weapon, until permanent international peace can be assured.

Groves proposed control of the program by a nine man part-time commission. He said that he would automatically disqualify from membership President James B. Conant of Harvard and Karl T. Compton of Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Smaller Schools He said that both institutions were too involved in nuclear research, and urged that presidents of such "smaller colleges as Amherst, Williams and Lafayette should be considered for membership.

By the same token, he said, representatives of the General Electric company and Westinghouse Electric should be barred from membership. He added that those companies were too closely connected with government work in the atom program.

BRITISH TROOPS LEAVING BOMBAY

Communicate Announces Also, Royal Indian Navy Men Being Segregated

BOMBAY, Feb. 27. (AP)—A British communique announced that all British troops were being withdrawn from Bombay Wednesday and disclosed that some Royal Indian Navy men—presumably ringleaders of the mutiny—have been "segregated."

The city is back to normal, the communique said, and everything is peaceful in the military camps. "There is no truth to the report that armored cars which patrolled the streets during the rioting fired their machineguns at civilians, the communique said. "There was no firing by crews of armored cars.

Makes Charges Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, congress party leader, charged Wednesday that the British government intends to "victimize and terrorize Royal Indian Navy mutineers despite promises to the contrary. Nehru told a press conference that he understood the government has issued instructions that "there is to be a very great deal of victimization and as a matter of fact terrorization of others besides ringleaders of the mutiny.

Defends Right Last night a vast gathering of 200,000 heard Nehru defend the right of Indian armed forces to revolt.

250 STUDENT NURSES STRIKE OVER RULES BARRING ROUGE USE

WILMINGTON, Del., Feb. 27. (AP)—Nearly 250 student nurses went on a 90-minute sit-down strike at the Delaware General Hospital Wednesday in protest against the barring of rouge use.

Dr. Joseph P. Leone, medical director, said the students objected to a ban on wearing lipstick and rouge on duty and "to some of the rules concerning time off and time on, social activities and whatnot—rules that are necessary to any well-run school of nursing."

NEGOTIATIONS BREAK DOWN

BATAVIA, Feb. 27. (AP)—An official announcement said Wednesday that negotiations with leaders of a native troop mutiny at Manado, in northern Celebes, had broken down temporarily because the leaders refused to obey Dutch orders.

WOMAN WITH SHOTGUN PRESSED TO TEMPLE GIVEN NARCOTIC

NEWPORT, N. H., Feb. 27. (AP)—Mrs. Natalie Reed, 36-year-old brunette, perched atop an eight-foot ladder with a shotgun pressed to her temple, was given a narcotic Wednesday in a glass of milk when she asked for a drink. Police express hope that the soporific would take effect before the woman could harm herself, following threats to end her life because she feared being taken to a state hospital. County Sheriff James F. McCusker said the woman left a barricade she had erected in the attic of a garage at her home and had climbed to the top of the ladder. When she complained of thirst, officers—not daring to seize her lest she carry out her threat—reached the glass of milk containing the narcotic to her.

REVENUE AGENTS AFTER CHISLERS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27. (AP)—The Internal Revenue has joined the government's drive against black marketeers of textiles, Secretary of the Treasury Fred M. Vinson announced Wednesday. The forces of the bureau have been combined with those of the Justice department and the Office of Price Administration to combat over-ceiling sales of textiles, regarded as inflationary. On Two Fronts The problem is being approached on two fronts, Vinson said. Jobbers who sell above ceilings will be prosecuted both for price violations and for failure to pay taxes on the resulting profits. And buyers of overpriced piece goods are being reminded that the illegal payments are not deductible from taxable income as "business expenses."

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"Sellers of textiles who have received more than ceiling prices for their goods—especially those who have attempted to conceal their profiteering by falsification of books and records are being investigated by revenue agents working closely with OPA investigators and with a special Federal grand

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Addressed Senate

Has Ideas He said he had a deep conviction that the only way to permanent peace and accord between the two great world powers lay in re-establishing a habit of "saying only what we mean and meaning every word we say."

"I have the feeling," Vandenberg added, "it is the best way to win Soviet respect and Soviet trust. Respect must precede trust; and both are indispensable to peace."

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
