JAPS MAKING DDT

TOKYO, Feb. 27-(P)-Manufacture of DDT, the potent insecticide, has been started by the Japanese, who are making notable strides in their production of supplies for disease control, it was announced Wednesday by Col. Crawford F. Sams, chief of Allied headquarters public health and welfare section. Heretofore all DDT used in Japan came from the United States and was used to prevent the spread of typhus.
