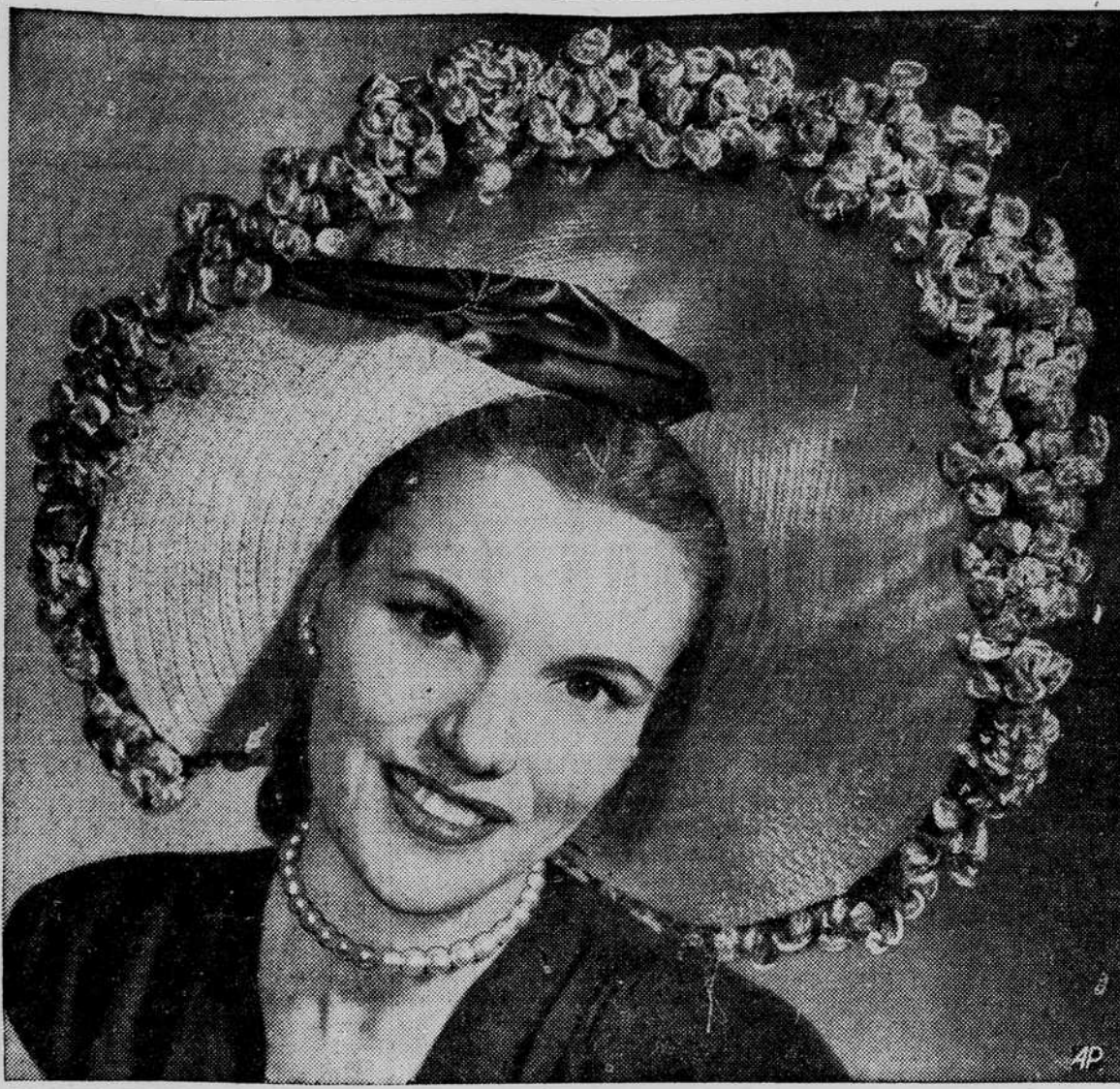


New Officers Elected By Chestnut P.-T. A.
