Terpsichorean Club Announces Final Plans For 22nd Annual Ball

The Terpsichorean club of Raleigh has announced final plans for North Carolina's 22nd annual Debutante Ball, which will be held September 13 in Memorial auditorium.

The program of events begins Friday, with registration of the debutantes on the mezzanine of the Sir Walter hotel. At 1 o'clock on Saturday the debutantes and their escorts will be entertained at a luncheon in the Virginia Dare ballroom at the Sir Walter hotel.

After receiving their instructions at the luncheon, the debutantes will meet at the Memorial auditorium at 8:30 o'clock for rehearsal of the beautiful and intricate debutante figure.

At 8 o'clock Friday evening the Debutante Ball will open in the Memorial auditorium with the Terpsichorean club figure and immediately following will be the presentation of the 1946 debutantes. At the conclusion of the presentation the debutantes will be officially welcomed by Governor R. Gregg Cherry. Dancing to the music of Bobby Byrne and his orchestra will follow.

Terpsichorean club officers will be hosts at a morning club at 11 o'clock Saturday morning honoring the debutantes and their marshals.

On Saturday afternoon between the hours of 3 and 6, Governor and Mrs. R. Gregg Cherry will entertain the debutantes and their escorts at a tea at the executive mansion. At 6:30 Saturday evening the debutantes and their escorts will attend an informal buffet supper at the Carolina Country club and immediately following a dance honoring the debutantes will be given at the Memorial auditorium.

The debutante figure will be led by Miss Marguerite Worth, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hal V. Worth of Raleigh, with James H. Pou Bailey, chairman of the ball. The Terpsichorean figure will be led by Alexander S. Badger, president of the club, and Mrs. Badger.

Local Art Club To Be Organized

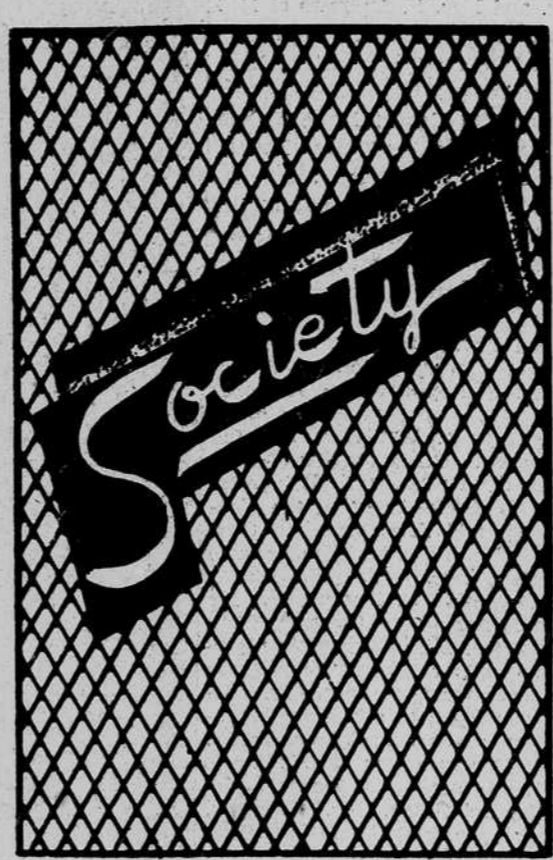
