

Under the plan proposed to CAB, Wilmington would be the company's secondary "hopoff" point for the Bermuda route in the event of bad flying conditions at Charleston. This proposal is especially appealing to Wilmingtonians, inasmuch as it would put the gorgeous winter playground that is Bermuda, a scant few hours from Front street and would make week-end flying to Bermuda possible for North Carolinians.

Colonial has already been granted a certificate for a route to Bermuda from New York and this certificate is the second granted to a U. S. flag carrier. Pan American holds the first certificate. Colonial plans to start survey flights from Washington to Bermuda early next month and plans to use four-engined equipment, probably DC-4's initially and perhaps later DC-6's.

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
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
