Native New Yorker

A native of New York, Miss Taylor began acting in school programs and at the age of 12 was receiving \$5 and \$10 for semi-professional appearances. She played in vaudeville briefly and in 1903, at the age of 19 played her first dramatic part - the title role in The Child Wife."

She married Charles A. Taylor, author of "From Rags to Riches," while she was playing in that production, her second theatrical role. They had two children, Marguerite and Dwight. The latter has been a Hollywood writer since 1930.

Miss Taylor's maiden name was Cooney, but she became Miss Taylor on the stage after her marriage. She was divorced from Taylor in 1910. The following year she married J. Hartley Manners, a Broadway playwright. He died

Private funeral services will be held Wednesda. She will be buried at Woodlawn cemetery here besides th grave of Manners.
