District Engineers Notified Of \$95 000 Allocation **By** Government WORK BEGINS

Money To Provide Temporary Relief To Shipping On Cape Fear

A notice of the allocation of the requested \$95,000 for maintenance and dredging of the Cape Fear river as approved by the Chief Corps of Engineers, was received vesterday afternoon by officials of the Wilmington District from Col. George W. Gillette, South Atlantic Division Corps of Engineers, local officials reported.

The request for the additional funds, required to provide temporary relief to shipping on the Cape Fear, stated that temporary **Diocese Schedules An**relief can be provided by restoring the channel to a depth of 30 feet and widths of 200 feet to the ocean bar and 150 feet to the river chan-Mrs. Arthur M. Maintenance work on the river channel is expected to be begun in the near future, now that the unds have been approved, local officials said. The District Engineers' dredge, the Hoffman, has already been put to work on the har, in the belief that the funds would be allocated.






