JACKSONVILLE, N. C., Feb. 1.—A coroner's jury today faced the problem "how did the gun, shells and Locklear happen to be in same place" when an inquest was held following a shooting near Holly Ridge Friday night, resulting in the deaths of two men.

Truman Indicates That He Hopes Congress Will Shun Severe Labor Bills

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1. (AP)—A plan of construction contractors and the AFL to arbitrate pay and other disputes with the aim of avoiding strikes was announced today by President Truman as a "notable step along the road to labor peace."

The affray was described as "one of the bloodiest in the history of the county" and resulted in the death of two men and the arrest of seven others.

One Survives As Aircraft Strikes Peak
