

Six coins dated from 1776 to 1897 were brought to the editor of "And-so-bed" by a young lady Tuesday, and shucks, we forgot to ask her name. She informed us the coins

were the property of Mrs. M. M. Sellers, 1807 Nunn street. The oldest was a British dime minted in 1776, which proves the English took time to make money during the American revolution. Mrs. Sellers, through the

young lady, said her husband gave her one of the coins when they were married. The ether
