MOSCOW, March 20 - (AP) -France and Great Britain split tonight on the future disposition of Germany's coal resources in the first serious disagreement among the Western powers at the Council of Foreign ministers.

Foreign Minister Georges Bidault notified the council that France could not consent to economic reconstruction of Germany unless the other powers agreed to her demands for gurantees of German coal.
