In order to make room for Tatum on their roster, the Reds optioned outfielder Bob Usher to Rochester of the International League. Usher hit .204 fo rine Reds in 1946.

NEW YORK, May 13 - (R) -Four New York Yankee home runs, three of them in succession to tie a major league record in the sixth inning, helped bury the St. Louis Browns under a 9-1 score today.


