

BEVIN, EDEN GET BOMBS IN MAIL

Former Foreign Secretary Has Close Call With Death Or Injury

LONDON, June 5. —(AP)—Scotland Yard said today that at least three more prominent Britons, among them Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin and his predecessor, Anthony Eden, had received vicious letter-bombs from Italy, making a total of 11.

A spokesman for the yard reported that the British Embassy in Paris also had received one of the ingenious bombs of gelignite, a pencil-sized battery and a detonator, all packaged in a cream-colored envelope. A spokesman for the embassy in Paris said, however, that there was "absolutely no truth" to this report.

The yard said it had received "certain information" about the bombs from "police and underground channels in other countries."

The yard's investigators thought that all of the original batch of letter-bombs had been destroyed. But they expected another batch to come in soon and agents were examining every piece of foreign mail.

Bevin never saw the letter-bomb intended for him. A secretary intercepted it and sent it posthaste

Supreme Court Decision Upholds College Trustees

RALEIGH, June 5. —(AP)—The State Supreme court today announced that it could find nothing wrong with the trustees of Wake Forest college in accepting a gift of approximately \$350,000 annually from the Z. Smith Reynolds foundation.

The court also said that it could find nothing wrong with the decision to remove the college from Wake Forest to Winston-Salem in order to collect the revenue.

"After all is said and done," Chief Justice Walter P. Stacy, wrote in the court opinion, "the case comes to a relatively narrow compass. Is a contract submitted for adjudication valid and enforceable. The trial judge (Judge Hubert Olive) thought it was. We approve."

"Wake Forest has had a long and honorable career, and whether it nestles in a forest of Wake (county) or stands in a knoll in Forsyth (county), its vission will remain a quest for truth and a crusade for simple right."

"We would not deny to this great institution and those whose faith and good words have made it possible, this vista of a new dawn, this vision of a new hope."

"The determinations made and conclusions entered below will be upheld."

"Affirmed."
