Following the wedding ceremony, a reception will be held at the home of Miss Doris Winstead, 110 Grace street.

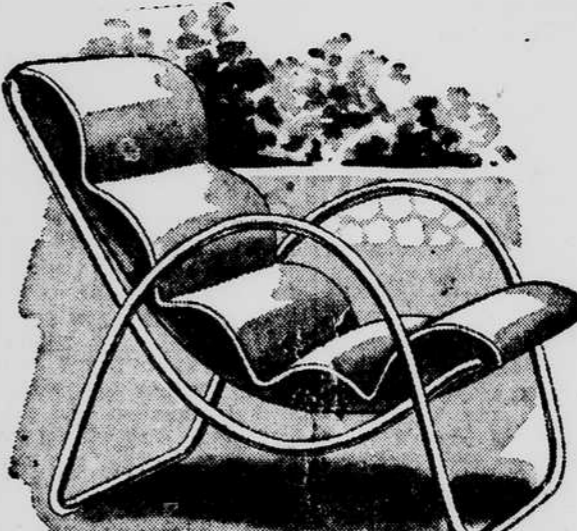
