## **City Engineer Electrocuted** When Storm Blows Radio Antenna Down

SHELBY, June 19-(AP)-A severe wind and electric storm here today resulted in unestimated property damage and the death of City Electrician Barney, J. Fowler, about 54.

Fowler, a city employe for the Pan American Airways past 15 years, died instantly after touching a wire carrying 2,300 volts of electricity which had been blown to the ground.

Heaviest property damage came when the wind toppled the 304-foot tower of radio station WOHS air tonight.


