### Under Bill, All Land, Sea, Air Forces To Be Under One Officer

ESTABLISHED 1867

WASHINGTON, July 9 -(AP) — The Senate stamped its approval tonight upon a permanent unification of the Army, Navy and Air Forces. The compromise measure-developed after repeated requests by President Truman during the past two years-now goes to the House where Republican leaders have it on their "must list".

The Senate passed the bill on a voice vote after rejecting a series of amendments by Senator E. V. Robertson (R-Wyo.), who with some support from Navy and Marine Corps enthusiasts, had been battling the measure.

Chairman Gurney (R-SD) of the Measure Makes Speaker Senate Armed Services committee and other supporters said the farreaching revision of the armed forces is necessary to save the United States from destruction when and if a future war strikes.
