

Demaret, Hogan Split \$3,000 Inverness Cash

BY FRITZ HOWELL TOLEDO, O., July 13—(AP)—Smiling Jimmy Demaret and little Ben Hogan split up the first prize of \$3,000, and a special purse for scoring the most birdies, as they copped the Inverness four-ball matches for the second straight year. They also became the only three-time victors in the best-ball classic as they wound up seven rounds of match play against seven other twosomes with a plus 12 score, two ahead of former champion Ellsworth Vines and big Clayton Kummer, who made a late surge to take over second place and \$1,700.

The winners started the day with a 13 carryover, and defeated a pair of Ghezzi and Ed (Porky) O'Neil by a hole this morning, before bowing two down to Herman Keiser and Herman Barron in the final match.

Ed Furgol, Pontiac, Mich., with the crippled arm, and George Schoups of San Francisco took over the tourney with a plus 4 score, third place, in a three-day decision to make a new champion Lawson Kummer and Lloyd Mangrum this morning and then playing Vines and Keiser an even match this afternoon.

Furgol and Schoups also took down an extra \$250, along with their third place \$1,300, for shooting the tourney with a score, a hole in hand, under par 60 with blistering speed over the event which they opened in their first joint to Thursday over the Inverness layout.

Hogan and Demaret scored 43 birdies and four eagles on their 126-hole jaunt, and finished 49 under par for the route, missing par on two holes. Furgol and Schoups, with 46 birdies and two eagles, were 46 under par for the distance, missing in four holes.

In the going over the par, eagles were counted as two birdies, giving Hogan and Demaret that \$250 prize for a single stroke over the youth-lad Furgol and Schoups.

The 16 professionals scored 322 birdies and eight eagles in the seven rounds, Demaret and Oliver getting three today on long par five holes.

National Open champions didn't take too well in the event, Mandate took little finishing last with a minus 13 count to collect \$60, a minus 10 from Worsham, present holder of the title, taking down \$700 for seventh place with his partner Johnny Palmer.

Barron and Keiser pushed into fourth place by beating Hogan and Demaret in the last match and winning \$1,000. Sam Snead and Dr. Cary Middlecoff were next for \$500, and Ghezzi and Oliver wound up with \$800 for sixth spot.

Red-Hot Yankees Keep Rolling At High Speed

CHICAGO, July 13.—(AP)—The New York Yankees scored their thirteenth and fourteenth straight victories by sweeping a doubleheader today from the Chicago White Sox, winning the first game 10-2 and the second, 6-4, before 43,102 fans.

The double victory moved the league-leading Yankees 10 1/2 games in front of the second place Detroit Tigers who divided a twin bill today with Philadelphia.

With today's victories, the Yankees need only two more consecutive wins to equal their longest winning streak of 16 straight in 1926. The major league record is 26 straight set by the New York Giants in 1916.

Bobo Newsom, purchased from Washington Friday on waivers, and young Vic Raschi, recalled from Portland last Thursday, were the two winning pitchers for New York.

Newsom gave up only five hits in the winning his first start with the Yankees in the opener. Raschi, with plenty of late assistance from Joe Page and Allie Reynolds, checked Chicago on nine hits in the afterpiece.

After a long drought, Red Springs finally broke one of their many losing spells by jumping on their favorite dais, the Wilmington Pirates, in both games of a doubleheader. They won the first 5-4, and clubbed three of Pirate hurlers in an 8-5 victory in the nightcap.

With Carl McQuillen and Shamrock Denning both running four markers across the plate, Dunn-Erwin had little trouble in lashing Warsaw, 16-4 in the Red Sox' own back yard.

Bob Holiday, Sanford outfielder, scored the only and winning run of the Spinner-Lefay when he forced Shoffner at second after the latter had singled, went to third on Bruce Hedrick's base-hit, and tripped in with the run when Bobby Keane hit to the right of the mound, pulling Zaykoski out of position to throw home.

Shoffner got three of Sanford's nine hits, and Dick Woodard, Smithfield cleanup man who had nothing to clean up, nevertheless contributed two of the Leaf's five hits. While striking out only four, House issued only two walks to Zaykoski's three. The Leaf hurler failed only one Spinner.
