Today's hand came up at Coro-

nado last year. The play is somewhat involved, and a good player might "blow" the hand. South wins the opening lead with the ace of clubs, takes three rounds of trumps, then takes the diamond finesse. East wins and shifts to a heart, and down goes declarer, losing two hearts, a diamond and a club. The correct line of play is to

win the first trick with the ace of clubs, take three rounds of trumps, winning the third round in the closed hand, then lead the five of clubs. The opening lead of the club king has marked West with the queen. West has to win this trick, and he shifts to a diamond. Declarer should go right up with dummy's ace, discard his seven of diamonds on the jack of clubs, then lead the queen of diaof fertilizer will hasten the growth monds.
