NEW YORK, Sept. 19 --Russia lost the first round of the veto battle in the United Nations Assembly tonight while the whole Soviet bloc drove ahead with its new campaign against the United States on 'war-mongering' charges.

Russia protested in a heated meeting of the 14-nation Steering committee against Assembly consideration of an Argentine proposal for a special U.N. conference on the veto. Argentina and others seek to abolish the great power veto.

The Steering committee passed the proposal on to the Assembly by a vote of 9 to 2. Russia and Poland were the two against. India, China and France abstained.
